*An overview of the security breach notices received by SCDCA from 2021 through 2025 as well as a detailed analysis of the security breach notices received in 2025.*

# INTRODUCTION

To aid in combating identity theft, South Carolina passed the Financial Identity Fraud and Identity Theft Protection Act (“FIFITPA”) in 2008. Among other things, FIFITPA imposes security breach notification requirements on private business and public bodies. If a business sends notice of a security breach to 1,000 or more South Carolina residents at one time, the business must also notify the Department and the national credit reporting agencies. When a business is required to notify the Department of a breach, the notice should include all of the following:

1. Date of the breach;
2. Date business became aware of the breach;
3. Date notice was/will be sent to affected consumers;
4. Method of consumer notification (i.e., direct mail, electronic mail, etc.)
5. Number of affected South Carolina consumers;
6. Content of the consumer notice (i.e., copy of the letter sent to consumers); and
7. Action taken to avoid future breaches.

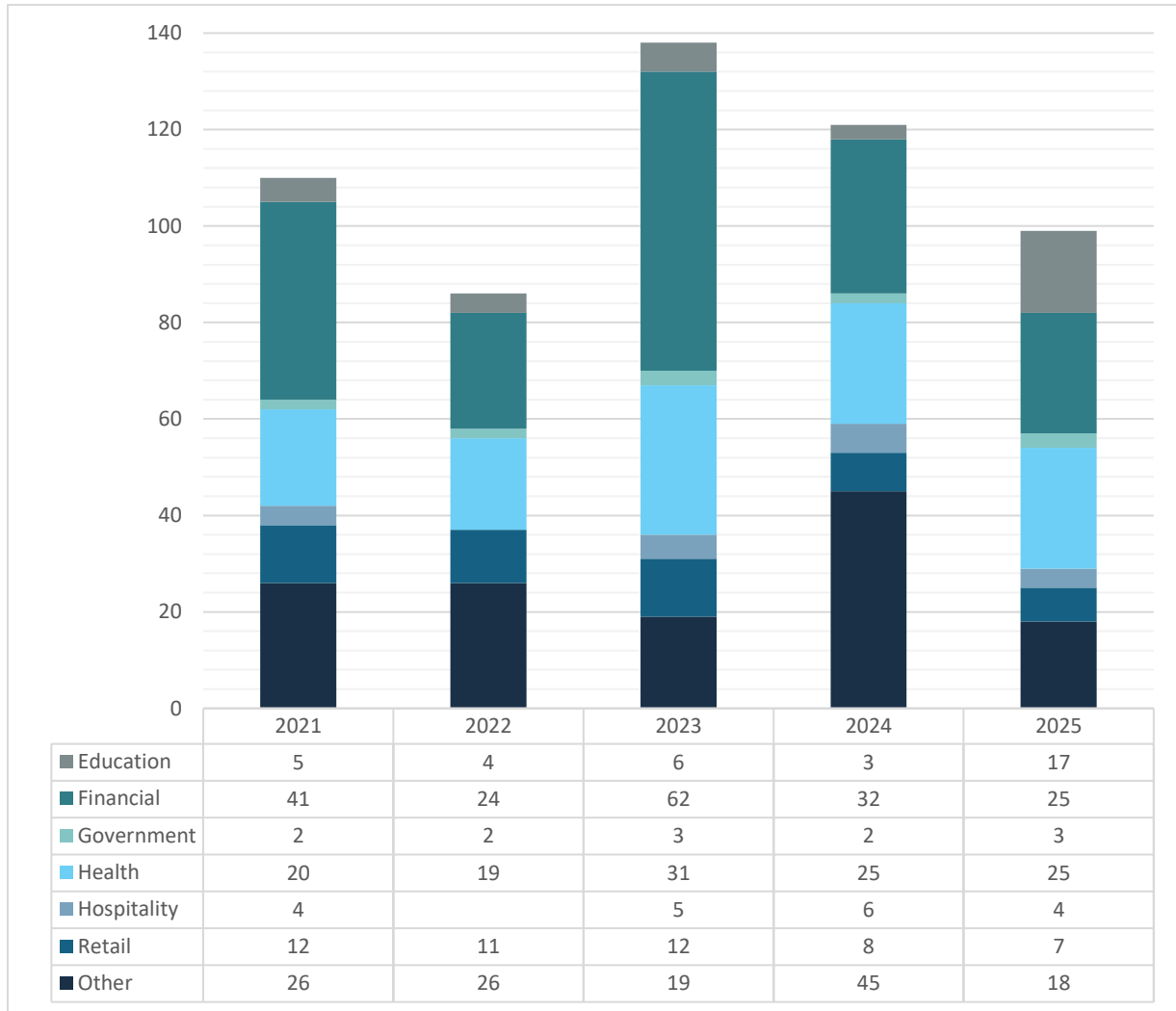

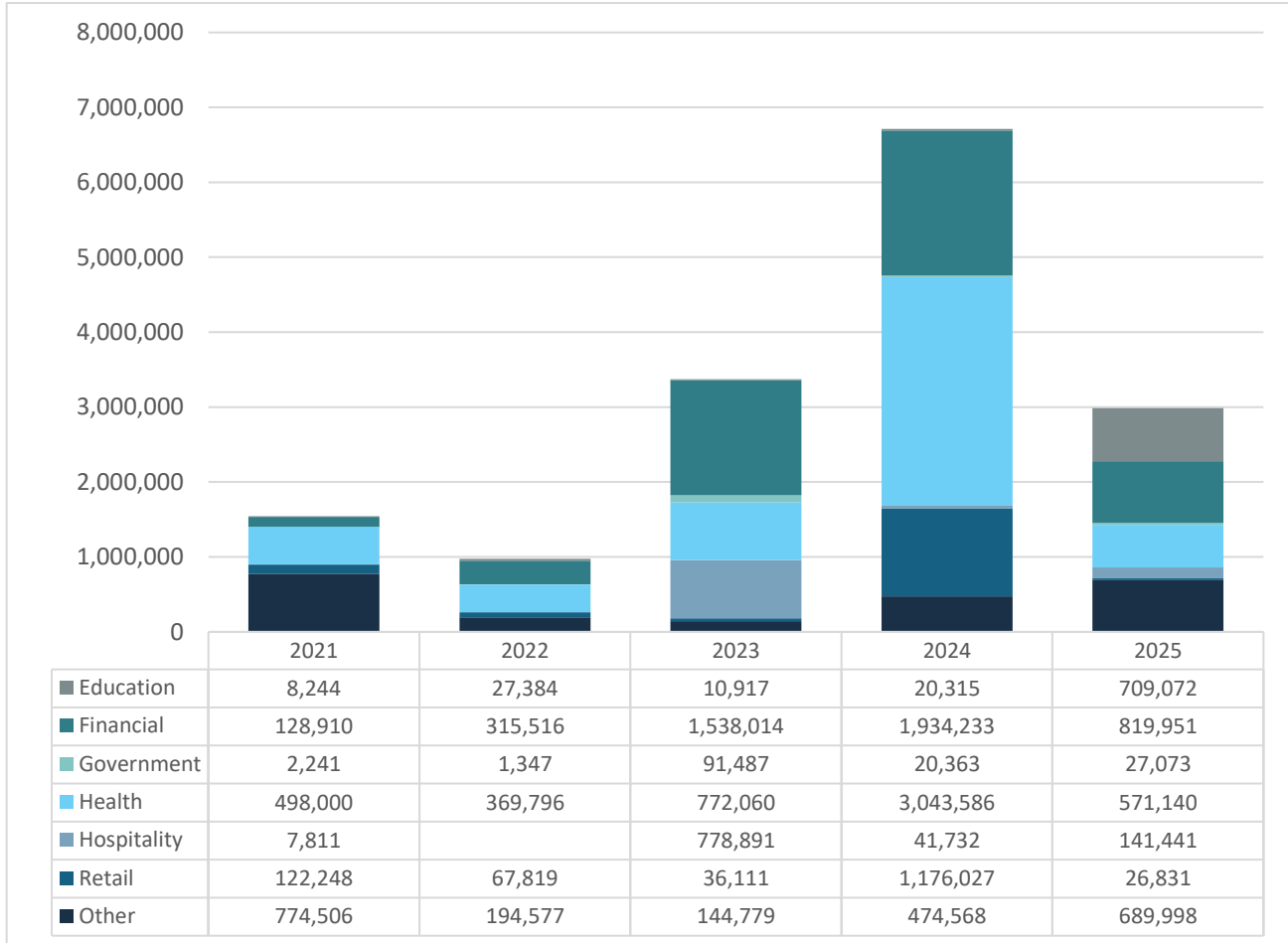

2021 – 2025**



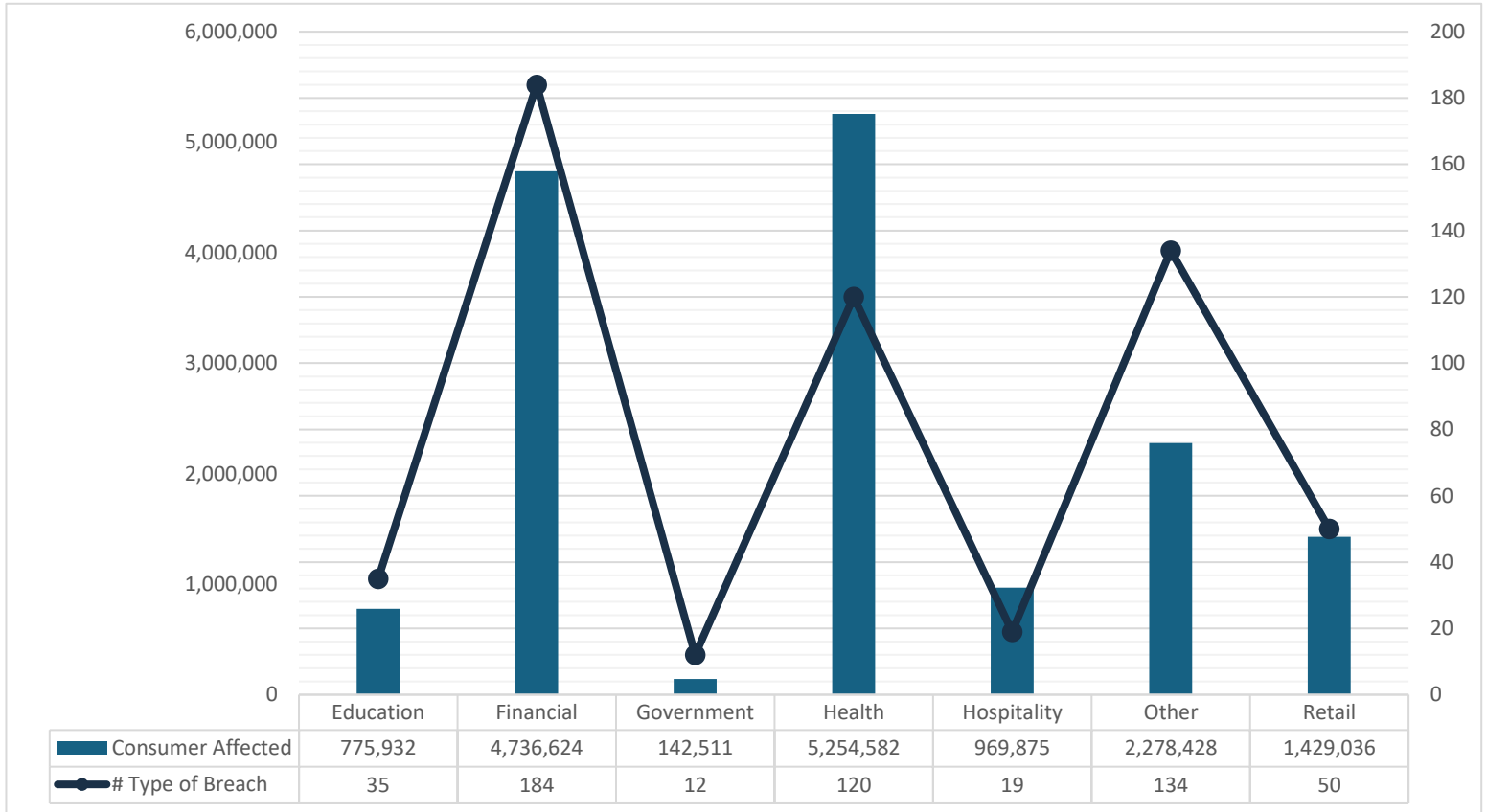
From 2021 to 2025, 554 businesses reported breaches to the South Carolina Department of Consumer Affairs (SCDCA). SCDCA received 110 notices in 2021. In 2022, 86 notices were reported. In 2023, 138 notices were received. In 2024, 121 notices were received. In 2025, SCDCA received 99 notifications.

2021 – 2025**



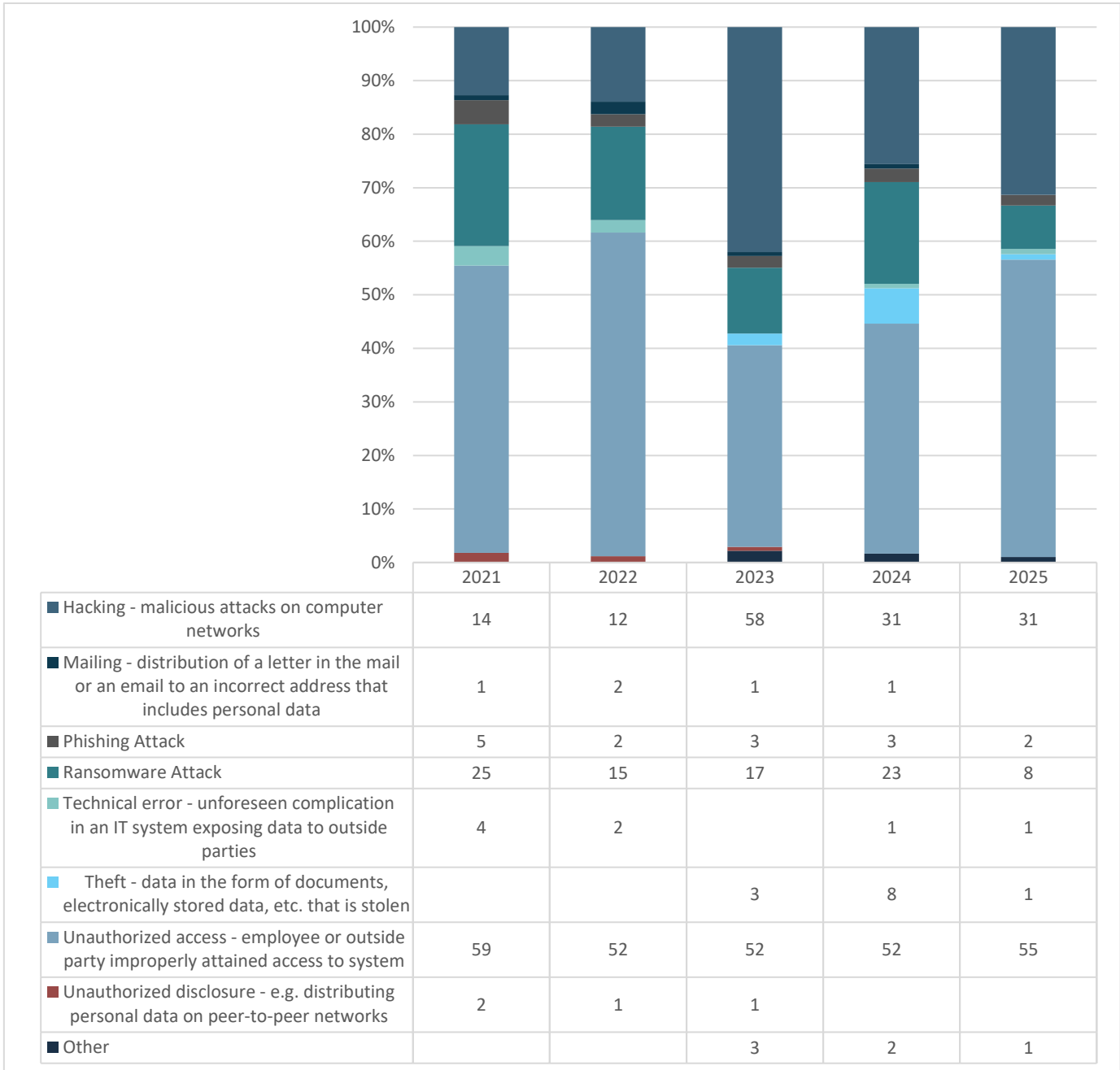
In 2025, breaches reported to SCDCA affected 2,985,506 South Carolina consumers. Please be aware as you read the information provided that many companies and organizations were unable to report a specific number of consumers affected, even after a thorough investigation had been completed. In these instances, the number of consumers affected was recorded as “0.” Therefore, the totals provided reflect the minimum number of South Carolina residents potentially affected and the actual number is likely significantly higher.

2021 – 2025**



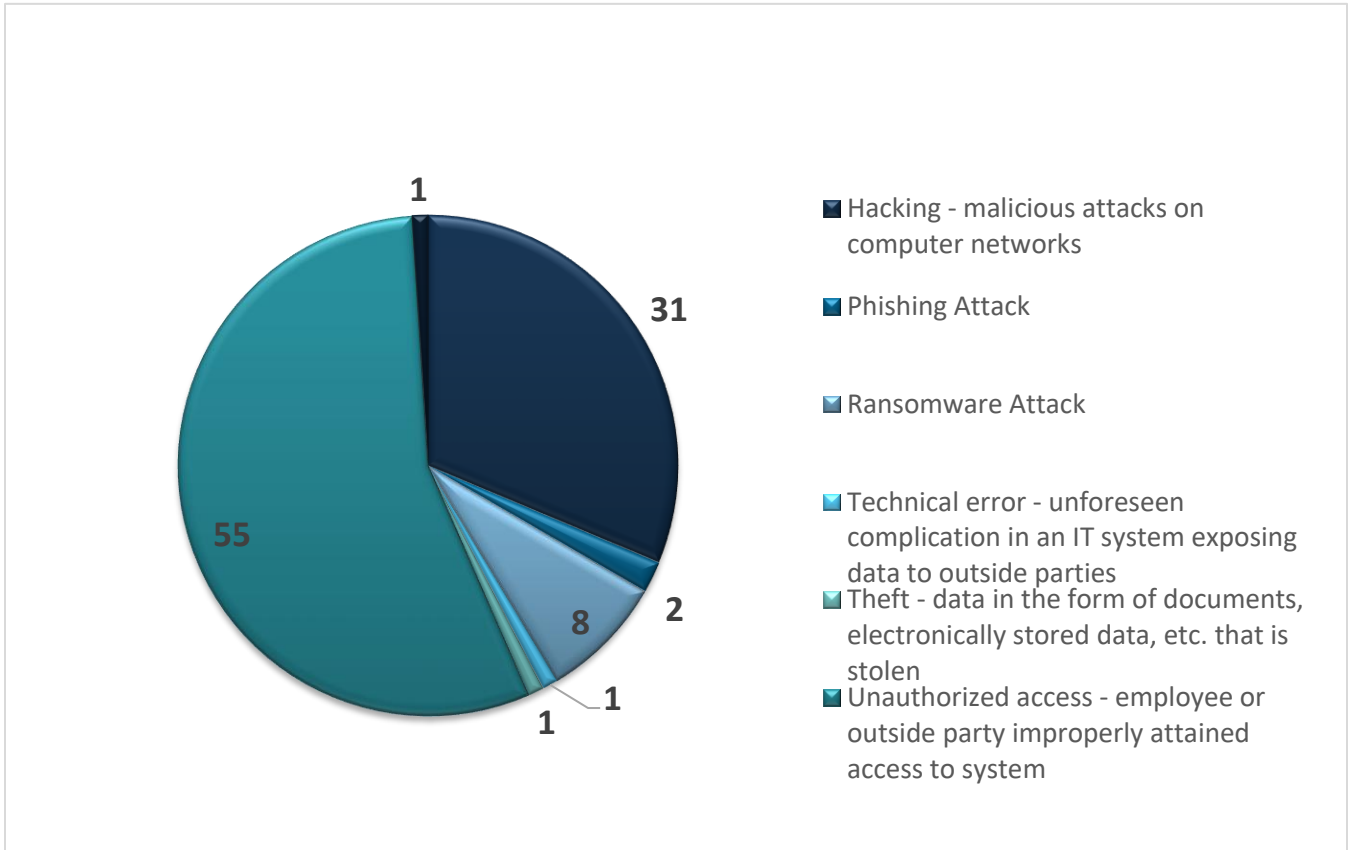
From 2021 through 2025, financial service providers reported one hundred eighty-four security breaches affecting just over 4.73 million residents. The healthcare industry reported one hundred twenty security breaches that affected just over 5.25 million residents. The retail industry reported fifty security breaches that affected more than 1.42 million residents. The hospitality industry reported nineteen breaches, which affected 969,875 residents. Education providers reported thirty-five security breaches affecting 775,932 residents. Governmental entities reported twelve security breaches affecting 142,511 South Carolina residents. Other industries falling outside these six main sectors filed one hundred thirty-four notices affecting just over 2.27 million consumers.

### Types of Breaches 2021 – 2025



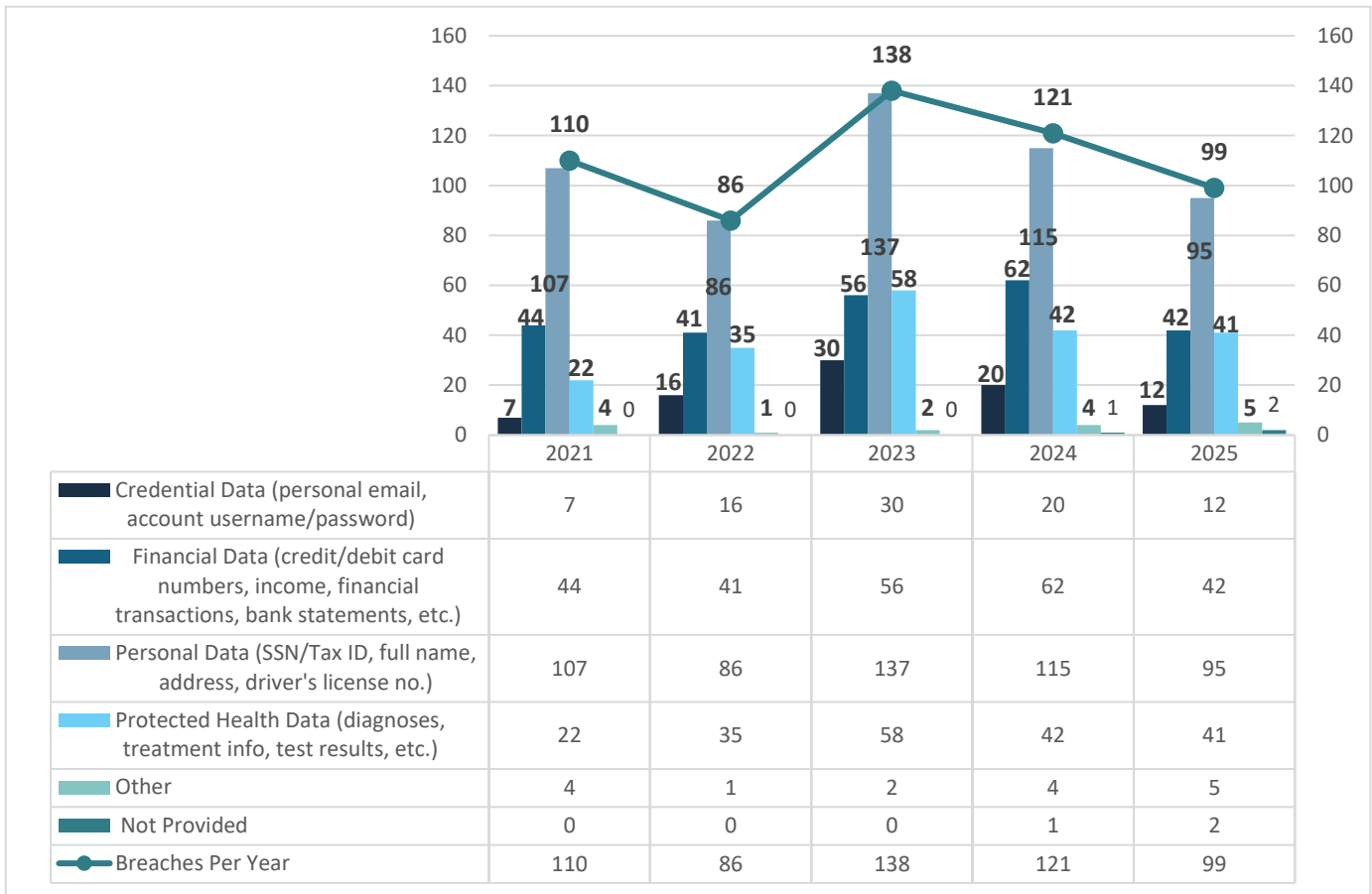
From 2021 to 2025, the most prevalent types of breaches have been unauthorized access (270), followed by hacking (148) and ransomware attacks (88).

### In Depth Look at the Types of Breaches in 2025



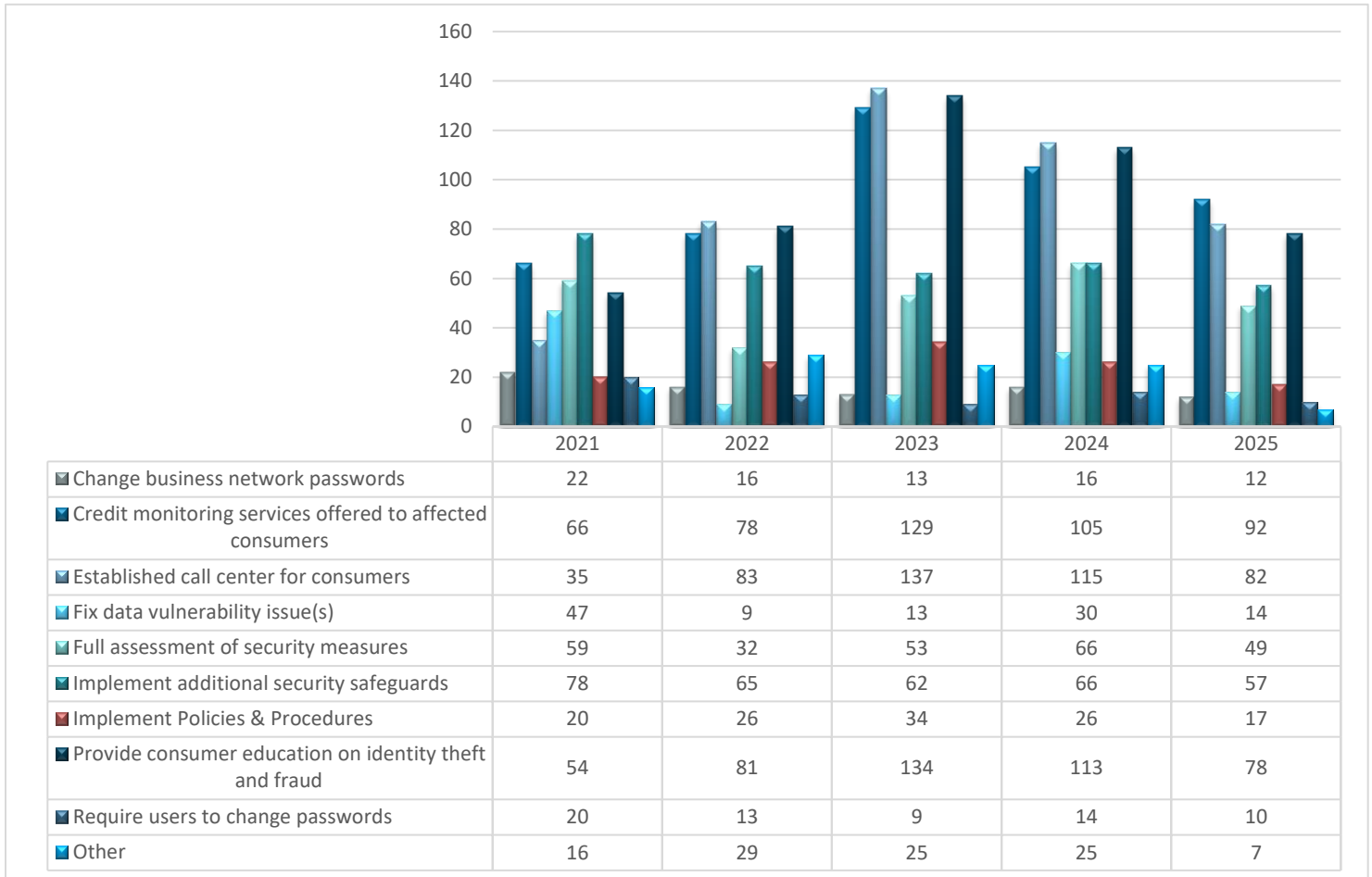
In 2025, SCDCA received fifty-five reports of security breaches due to unauthorized access, representing 55% of the total breaches reported for the year. Thirty-one security breach notices (31% of total) were due to hacking.

### Types of Data Breached 2021 – 2025



From 2021 to 2025, SCDCA received 554 reports of security breaches. Of those, 540 (97%) reported breaches involved the exposure of protected personal data; 245 (44.2%) involved financial data; 198 (35.7%) indicated compromised protected health data; 85 (15.3%) implicated credential data; and 16 (2.9%) involved other types of potentially sensitive information. SCDCA’s methodology recognizes that multiple types of data can be breached within one security breach.

### Remediation Steps Taken by Reporting Organizations 2021 – 2025



SCDCA’s methodology tracks multiple remediation steps taken by an organization in response to a security breach. For the 554 breaches reported 2021–2025, 84.8% offered free credit monitoring services to affected consumers; 83% provided consumer education on identity theft and fraud; 81.6% established a dedicated call center for affected consumers.
